THE INAUGURATION OF THE RICHARD JOSEPH LEARNING CENTRE AT THE NIGERIAN INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

The Nigerian Institute of International Affairs (NIIA) hosted the inauguration of the Richard Joseph Learning Centre on Friday, 7 February 2025, at the Institute's library. The event brought together prominent academics and intellectuals, including the benefactor, Professor Richard Joseph, the Director-General of the NIIA, Professor Eghosa Osaghae, and distinguished scholars such as Professor Bolaji Akinyemi, Professor Femi Otubanjo, and Professor Adele Jinadu. Associate Professor Godwin Ichimi, in his citation of Professor Joseph, highlighted his expertise in governance, conflict resolution, and his contributions to election missions in The Gambia and Ghana. He also noted Professor Joseph's affiliation with the Council of Foreign Relations.

Professor Richard Joseph, speaking at the inauguration, shared his vision for the Centre as a hub for collaborative learning and access to educational resources for young scholars. He introduced his framework for intellectual engagement, encapsulated in the ABCDE (Achievements, Books, Chronicles, Design, Education) and the 7Es (Educatio, Enterprise, Efficiency, Ethics, Equity, Environment). Professor Adele Jinadu described the initiative as a revival of the golden era of think-tank scholarship, emphasizing its potential to advance Africa's intellectual and developmental aspirations.
